Commander Melvey was born and raised in Fargo, ND. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota in 1987. He has a Master of Business Administration degree from the Terry College of Business, University of Georgia. He joined the Naval Reserve through the Advanced Pay Grade accession program in 1992 and received his commission through the Direct Commissioning Program in 1997. In 2000, he was selected into the Full Time Support Officer program.

His sea duty tours include serving as Supply Officer in USS VANDEGRIFT (FFG 48) and in USS MUSTIN (DDG 89), both homeported in Yokosuka, Japan. While assigned to USS VANDEGRIFT and USS MUSTIN, he participated in many multi-lateral exercises and deployments throughout the Western Pacific Ocean. He served as Assistant Supply Officer and Food Service Officer in USS SEATTLE (AOE 3), homeported in Colts Neck, NJ and Norfolk, VA. While assigned in USS SEATTLE, he deployed and participated in operations in the North Arabian Sea and the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Command Master Chief (SCW) Arrington. He graduated from Hueytown High School in 1988 and attended Recruit Training Command Orlando, FL, in June 1989. After "Boot Camp," he attended Equipment Operator "A" School at Naval Construction Training Center (NCTC), Gulfport, MS, and graduated in December. His first tour of duty was with Naval Mobile Construction Battalion (NMCB) 24. He then converted from SELRES to active duty and received orders to NMCB 133 Gulfport, MS. During his tour, he was advanced to Equipment Operator Third Class. After four years, he transferred to Naval Air Station, Kingsville, TX. During this tour he was advanced to Petty Officer Second Class. Next, he received orders to NMCB 7, Gulfport, MS. He deployed to Honduras in support of disaster relief efforts and advanced to First Class Petty Officer.

In 2002, he reported to NCTC, where he advanced to Chief Petty Officer and served as Course Manager, School Director and HQ Company Commander. He then reported to NMCB 74 where he deployed to Okinawa, Pakistan, and Guam. During this tour, he served as Water Well OIC, Embark Chief and was promoted to Senior Chief. He then accepted orders to NMCB 24, Huntsville, AL, where he served as the RSS Supervisor and deployed to Al'Asad, Iraq, as the Water Well OIC and Embark Chief. He then reported to NMCB 11. While assigned to NMCB 11 he served as the AS in Okinawa and Afghanistan. During his tour, he was promoted to Master Chief.

In November 2012, he reported to NCTC Gulfport, where he served as the Acting Command Master Chief. He now serves as the Command Master Chief of Navy Cargo Handling Battalion ONE since November 2014.

Master Chief Arrington is designated Seabee Combat Warfare Specialist. His awards include the Joint Service Commendation Medal, Navy/Marine Corps Commendation Medal (4), Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (4), and various other awards.

CHEATHAM ANNEX

History

York County encompasses 108.5 Square Miles or 69,440 Acres. Naval Weapons Station Complex (including Cheatham Annex) 20.7 Square Miles. Roughly 1/5 of the total land area of York County. Naval Weapons Station borders the counties of York and James City, the cities of Newport News and Williamsburg, and shares almost 14 miles of the York River shoreline (about half of the county's York River shoreline and wetlands) with the National Park Service.

The land of Naval Weapons Station Yorktown is rich in colonial history. The station sits amidst a setting of natural beauty surrounded by the distant echo of the first settlers in Virginia and the battle cries of the Revolutionary War. Long before the world ever conceived of such things as the testing and evaluation that now go on at the weapons station, the infantry of the American Revolution and the Civil War slogged along the Old Williamsburg Road where today it runs through the station. The oldest structure onboard the Yorktown Naval Weapons Station is the Lee House, built around 1649, where many generations of the family lived out their lives before the property was acquired by the U.S. government.

The site of the weapons station was acquired for the Navy by a presidential proclamation on August 7, 1918, and was at the time the largest naval installation in the world, its land area covering about twenty square miles. Over the years, the growth and expansion of the Navy's technical requirements and responsibilities have been reflected by corresponding developments at the station to support the Atlantic Fleet.

As part of the Navy's Mid-Atlantic installation claimant consolidation, Cheatham Annex, formerly an annex of the Fleet Industrial Supply Center, Norfolk, was incorporated with the station on October 1, 1998. This area of land located in the Jamestown, Williamsburg, Yorktown historical triangle was acquired by the Navy on June 21, 1943. Naval Weapons Station Yorktown hosts 25 tenant commands which include the Atlantic Ordnance Command, the Naval Ophthalmic Support and Training Activity, the Marine Corps Second Fleet Anti-Terrorism Security Team, Fleet Industrial Supply Center Detachment, Fleet Hospital Support Office, Navy Cargo Handling and Port Group and 19 Storefronts.

The station and tenant commands work together as a team to provide ordnance logistics, technical, supply and related services to the Atlantic Fleet. Today the station is a hub of activity. As one of the Navy's "explosive corridors" to the sea, supply, amphibious and combatant ships may be seen arriving and departing the station's two piers.

U. S. Naval Cargo Handling Battalion ONE was established October 1, 1949. Its organization was based on the World War II Special Construction Battalions and Logistics Support Companies that established forward area supply bases in the Pacific theater. Originally home ported at Davisville, RI, NCHB 1 relocated to Cheatham Annex, Williamsburg, VA, in 1953, in 1970 the unit's name was changed to Navy Cargo Handling and Port Group then to U.S. Navy Cargo Handling Battalion ONE on 17 July 2003.



NCHB1 reports to Commander, First Navy Expeditionary Logistics Regiment of Navy Expeditionary Logistics Support Group. NCHB1 is the Navy's only active duty cargo handling battalion and is a rapidly deployable operating unit of the Navy Expeditionary Combat Command capable of loading/discharging ships and aircraft in all climatic and threat conditions. NCHB 1 specializes in in-stream cargo handling with the capability to perform air and terminal freight operations.





NCHB 1 is capable of providing independent mission tailored detachments, or fully deploying as a self sustaining unit anywhere in the world. At full strength, in support of an amphibious assault, NCHB 1 can operate around the clock, simultaneously discharging a full Maritime Prepositioning Squadron. Operations can be conducted through an established port or utilizing lighterage during in-stream operations. Significant missions include annual deployments to Antarctica since 1956 and Operation Desert Storm in 1991. In December 2002 the entire Battalion made a wartime deployment to Camp Patriot, Kuwait where it remained for 11 months offloading and later back-loading USMC combat gear and ammunition.

Significant achievements during deployments include offload of two Maritime Prepositioning Ship Squadrons, simultaneous six ship operations at two remote locations, air cargo operations, break-bulk ammunition operations, in-stream offload of Elevated Causeway System; Joint Logistics Over The Shore operations, camp security, and safe execution of hundreds of armed convoys. Between 2006 and 2008, the Battalion sent detachments to AL Asad Air Base, Iraq in support of the Marine Aviation Logistics Support Squadron. Recently, NCHB 1 deployed to Haiti and Guantanamo Bay for disaster relief in support of OPERATION UNIFIED RESPONSE and deployed an air cargo detachment to Camp Bastion, Afghanistan in support of Marine aviation. NCHB 1's versatility and unique capabilities make it a critical asset in solving the challenge of expeditionary logistics support to U.S. operating forces around the globe.
